## Commemoration of Achievement 2017-2018 City of Sutherlin

Two years... Yes, going back just two-years and moving forward to today, the City of Sutherlin has been immersed in teamwork, commitment to service and productivity. When long-time and loved, city employee, Debbie Hamilton, announced her retirement, we decided to pause to celebrate her 25-years of service to our city and further, to reflect on the past two-critical years of city achievements, January 2017 through December 2018.

When our city manager brought Bruce Brunette, CEO for Oregon Only ([www.oregononly.com](http://www.oregononly.com)) to Sutherlin to consider a major investment in our community, Bruce commented to me that we (City of Sutherlin) were not like the other cities he had dealt with. "Why?" I asked; he said, "you (city council and city staff) are thinking and working years ahead of others, always seeking a way to make something happen, even if it required action outside the normal approach of local government." This conversation led to the creation of a new city organizational meme: "***Sutherlin, Leading the Way.***" I was intrigued by this slogan and began looking at various definitions on the computer. The one that caught my attention was:

***"To be the first or most prominent in some field or action."***

With that, I asked staff to brainstorm and create a poster with this new cultural meme that best represents our council-staff-team and collective work ethic. This poster is now prominently displayed in each departmental area which includes staff photographs. The council chambers too, has this poster with, soon to be, photos of all members of city council prominently displayed for our citizens to see who is representing them. All of us at the City are proud of an organizational culture that is focused upon service, innovation, creativity in problem-solving and purposeful character that avoids seeking credit, accepts responsibility, and focuses continuously on the results.

Yes, our little city leads or has led the way in many local community projects and initiatives. For example, our Police Department was the first in Douglas County to outfit our personnel with body cameras and place cameras in our police cars. We too, provided medical devices in each car and our officers carry a special tourniquet that has saved at least three lives so far this past year. When Douglas County closed down the library system, we were the first and initially the only city that kept our library in operations and became a certified municipal library. We were the first to raise funds and construct a children's playground and splash pad. Through a citizen task force, we just established a new fire services model that includes cross-trained Public Works employees as certified firefighters, 15 dedicated volunteers, 6 fire/med students from UCC and 4 full-time staff. Prior to this new and innovative approach we were a "fire only" response agency. We now provide a full-service fire/life/safety response organization for only \$56,588.00 more than the previous "fire only" service delivery model.

Finally, take a look at our web page and see our vision, leadership and purposeful strategic action in pioneering our little city into the 22<sup>nd</sup> century (on the Government tab). Please also observe our Strategic Plan, one with incredible detail outlining our vision, mission, operational philosophy, goals, actions and departmental work-tasks all with accountability benchmarks. I would assert, that very few communities our size or any size have put this in place. We also, annually review and develop a list of "Council Priorities" that are then inserted into the Strategic Plan and posted regularly for our citizens to see where their tax dollars are going on a year-to-year basis. This newsletter highlights our "Top 10" critical achievements through the last 2-years and celebrates Debbie Hamilton's remarkable 25-year career here with the City. "*Congratulations Debbie!*"

## DEBBIE HAMILTON

### Jerry Gillham, City Manager

Debbie Hamilton will be retiring after 25 years of public service with the City of Sutherlin on November 30th. She's most commonly known here as Deb. As of now Debbie Hamilton, our Community Relations Director, Library Director and Senior City Recorder, is our longest tenured employee. She started in October of 1993 as the Utility Billing Clerk. We had computers back then but were only DOS style and did very little especially compared to now. She printed out the post card sized utility bills that came out in long sections that had to be separated and sorted into groups to be mailed. She hand entered each and every meter read once they were read, recorded and delivered to her by public works worker and meter reader, Joe Gardner. They had approximately a dozen plus notebooks that were taken out into the field to record the reads. She said they would often come back with rain drops, mud or smears or all three on the pages. At that time our population was said to be a little over half of what it is now. It wasn't until about 1995 or so, that we switched to a handheld meter reader, and the numbers were punched in and then could be downloaded to the computer.

In 1998 the former City Hall, which is now the Police Dept., was bursting at the seams with four workstations, file cabinets, a large copy machine, other miscellaneous items, and a coffee station that filled an area that now has only two workstations in it and a filing counter. So began the move of the Fire Department to the old Public Works building on S. State Street after the new public works building was constructed out on S. Calapooia. Once that move was made they began the task of turning the fire truck bays into offices. The public works crew did almost all the work to what it is today. The move took place to the new offices the latter part of 1998.

Debbie was instrumental in getting the large "Sutherlin" logo sign that is still in City Hall today. It's the first thing you notice when you come through the front door. She had visited the Springfield City Hall and saw one similar to what we now have. Upon her return she discussed with then City Manager Don Moore, he gave her the go ahead to get one done for Sutherlin. A different font and color was used to make it Sutherlin's own. It's made of Styrofoam type product and was a teal color for several years and is currently updated to black.

I asked Deb to give me some pictures of herself to put with the article and her response was there were very few since she was the one always taking the pictures at City Hall for the past 25 years. Most of her pictures come from the Oregon Association of Municipal Recorders (Clerks) where she's been a member since 2001. After my encouragement three years ago she began the journey of serving on the OAMR Board. First as Second Vice President in 2016, then in 2017 as First Vice President and this past year she served in the prestigious position of OAMR President. Her term just ended September 21st where she was honored at their annual conference in Portland. OAMR covered the costs while sending her to the International Institute of Municipal Clerks Annual Conferences in Montreal, Canada, Omaha, NE, Norfolk, VA, as well as, the Region IX Annual State Conferences to Anchorage, Alaska twice, Berkeley, California, and Pasco, Washington. She shared with us that she feels incredibly blessed to have been able to end her career representing Oregon and the City of Sutherlin at all of these special events during the past three years.

As the time draws near for her departure from the daily tasks at hand she shares that it's a little scary and a bit emotional for her. While Deb works for me, I consider her a friend and close to being my sister. There has been no one as special as she has been in working with side-by-side for seven years. I will miss her immensely and the whole city will miss her as well. I love Debbie Hamilton from my heart and you would too had you had the pleasure of working with her for the past seven years like me. God bless this new chapter for you Deb!

## Emergency Preparedness

In 2016, City Council asked the City Manager to update the city's Emergency Operations Plan and establish emergency preparedness as a new city operational element. Former Police Chief Sanfilippo and City Manager Gillham updated the Emergency Operations Plan that included completing the required FEMA/NIMS training certifications. Both achieved certification and then Chief Sanfilippo retired. City Manager Gillham promoted a new Chief of Police from within; Chief Troy Mills, had already completed his training.

In 2017, City Manager Gillham then instituted a full-scale emergency operations team that included a volunteer Emergency Manager. Dennis Riggs, in fact, has become the City of Sutherlin, Emergency Manager. Upon his arrival, for the past year and half, Riggs has been earning his Emergency Manager certifications and is now fully qualified to serve as an Emergency Manager and teach emergency operations to other individuals and agencies. Riggs has become an incredible resource to the City of Sutherlin. Because of his work, organization and leadership the city now has a primary Emergency Operations Center (EOC) fully-equipped and three alternative EOC's. The City Manager, with Riggs' help, has written EOC position descriptions for all city staff and he is in the process of providing individualized training for each employee with an EOC assignment. All city staff have, so far this year, participated in three EOC table-top drills so that we will be prepared to respond to any emergency.

Riggs has set up the most sophisticated radio communications system over any entity we can compare. He has also recruited over 30 volunteers to serve as Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members that during an emergency are assigned a grid-area of the city and they provide status reports back to the Emergency Operations Center during an emergency event.

The continuation of library services after the county withdrew financing and ongoing management, is another remarkable example of partnership like that of the Ford's Pond partnership described on page 7. The City, the Sutherlin School District and over 40 volunteers came together to keep our library open. The City covers the cost of all maintenance, inside and out, building debt service, and a part-time Library Operations Manager while the school district provides computer and technical service. City Council created a special Library Advisory Board, currently Chaired by Rick Troxel. The library is now certified as a Municipal Public Library and the city-school partnership purchased and installed a new web-site that allows our citizens access to all other state certified libraries that will soon be available. 
## Public Works



We truly believe that our Public Works crews under the leadership of Director, Aaron Swan, and Supervisors, Gary Fugate, Randy Harris, and John Bachman are the finest assemblage of honest, hard-working individuals any city could have. They are a pleasure to have working for the City. They, are the labor back-bone of the city in maintaining all city facilities, streets and rights-of-way, infrastructure and lands. Public Works has three divisions: Facilities, Water and Wastewater.

All three teams came together and spent countless hours putting the splash pad and playground equipment together last summer; we've never seen so many nuts and bolts in one place! This past summer the facilities crew worked to get the lamp posts installed along with waterline attachments to keep the flowers watered while up. They have been re-setting the benches and putting things back in place that had to be moved during the construction process. The next steps are planting the trees and small shrubs to complete the look for downtown which should be planted next week. All that in between the meter reads, turning on/off services, water leaks, utility locates, street sweeping and the general public works daily duties.

# Ford's Pond



The purchase of Ford's Pond and 225 acres of land was, at the time in 2014, strictly a business decision. Although the value was estimated at \$1.8M, we purchased the pond for \$3M because the next best alternative for purchase and development was over \$21M. Additionally, Ford's Pond was turn-key in that there were no other regulatory and costly permits required other than running the discharge pipe from the plant to the pond. Neighbors and other outdoor enthusiasts approached the city with the idea of turning what would have been a simple wastewater storage pond, into a multi-use recreational reserve/park. And that is exactly what we are doing in partnership with a new non-profit, "Friends of Ford's Pond." There is currently fishing, kayaking, boating, bird watching, and hiking available, but will eventually include biking, day-camping, picnicking, a playground area and other outdoor family activities. ## Police Services

**T**he Sutherlin Police Department prides itself in community, education, teamwork and collaboration. This year we partnered with “Fight Crimes: Invest in Kids” to bring awareness to the community about the program. This program is dedicated to investing early in childhood learning in order to give them the tools to be successful in the future. We visited Sutherlin Schools as part of outreach; read to pre-k students and spoke to the media about the importance of investing in quality early learning.

The Sutherlin Police Department also held its First Annual “Police Ice Cream Social”. The event was to bring the community together for a meet and greet with police staff, as well as giving children a positive experience with law enforcement. The event catered to school age students by letting them “Dunk a Cop” in a dunk tank and giving them free ice cream and school supplies. The children and families were able to look at police equipment first hand and have their questions answered about the law enforcement career.

The Sutherlin Police Department also took part in “Coffee with a Cop” at the local Sutherlin Starbucks, participated in the “Special Olympics Law Enforcement Torch Run”, “Shop with a Cop” in Roseburg and worked with the Sutherlin Fire Department to participate in the annual “Police and Fire Appreciation Open House” organized by local groups and businesses, and lead the way by bringing informational classes to the public on items of interest and public concern.

### **Police Department at a Glance -**

1. Restructuring took place this past year to include a Chief, Captain, 2 Sergeants, and 14 sworn officers, which also includes 1 Police Office Supervisor, 1 Record Specialist, 1 Code Enforcement Officer, and 1 Municipal Court Clerk.
2. A Police Sergeant’s Office was built to provide adequate office space inside the Police Department.
3. The inside of the Police Department was painted to provide a modern look to the internal office space.
4. The outside trim of City Hall and the Police Department was painted to match the new street lights in order to give a corresponding appearance.
3. Vehicle Repeaters were purchased for all patrol vehicles which will be the first agency in Douglas County to fully deploy this technology.
4. Vehicle camera systems are being installed with upgraded digital technology in all patrol vehicles.
5. Brought regional police training to Sutherlin, as well as conducted interagency training with local departments in topics such as active shooter (Douglas High School), Tactical Firearms, Use of Force, Taser, and Defensive Tactics among a few.
6. Assisted local agencies with staffing for special events (Douglas County Fair, Winston Graffiti, Roseburg Graffiti, and Myrtle Creek Rodeo).
7. Held our first annual Police Ice Cream Social at Central Park. This was a gathering to give the children and parents of Sutherlin a chance to meet officers and staff. SPD gave out school supplies, free ice cream, and gave the children a chance to dunk an officer via dunk tank.
8. Held several public educational meetings/presentations to educate citizens on topics such as cyber-crimes, identity theft, driving under the influence (DUII), bicycle safety, and security.

# Police Services



## Community Development/New Projects

**C**ommunity Development holds the critical responsibility of planning and constructing the City of Sutherlin into the future. The team of Brian Elliott, Community Development Director, Kristi Gilbert, Community Development Specialist, and Jamie Chartier, City Planner, is responsible for transportation and land-use planning, long-range planning, building code program, economic development and processing all new development proposals and permit applications. Below is just a sampling of the department's recent achievements.



**Central Park Splash Pad and Play-Ground Upgrades** - The Central Park playground area got a much needed upgrade to the play equipment and added a splash pad area that has been a major hit with the kids and parents! Opening up for the first time late last summer it was packed nearly every single day until the Fall weather hit. It was noted that visitors from as far south as Canyonville and Riddle and north to Drain visited on a regular basis. The area was fenced on 3 sides to prevent the little ones from wandering out into the street and to, hopefully, discourage dogs and bike/skateboard riders from entering the area.

**Central Avenue** - As Central Avenue began to rapidly deteriorate, city staff applied for state grant dollars to help pay for restoration. Our first attempt in 2013 failed to obtain funding. In 2014 when federal and state funds were available for grants in our area dwindled down to \$2M, we approached ODOT with the idea of Sutherlin taking over Central Avenue from Comstock to Calapooia in exchange for them giving us monies to fully restore that section. Because federal grant dollars dwindled down from \$40M to \$2M, the city manager proposed to ODOT that Sutherlin not compete for these dollars, but rather award extra monies in our Transfer of Authority agreement and therefore, Sutherlin would not compete with other communities in the region. ODOT agreed and offered the city \$2.15M. This was a near doubling of the monies needed to rebuild Central from Comstock to Calapooia. City staff then acquired an additional \$700,000 from Douglas County to take over Central from Calapooia to State Street. ODOT then approached the City to ask us to take an additional \$600,000 to pave Hwy 138W from Church Road to Comstock. Once we assembled all these monies, we were just \$500,000 short for completing Central all the way to the city limits and carrying out additional downtown streetscape improvements. ODOT again offered up a loan for 1.6% and this loan is being paid back by annual state gas-tax dollars and NOT property taxes.

- **New Housing** - Homes are being built in the Fairway Ridge Estates Phase 1 consists of 23 homes. These homes will be located off Scardi Blvd up behind the golf course. Total homes indicated in the three phases is 76.
  - Forest Heights Subdivision** - There are 24 homes proposed in this subdivision located off Waite Street, where they have begun building at this time.
  - Comstock Subdivision** - Building 21 home total done in two phases.
- **Transportation Planning** - We are now in the process of revising and updating the 2005 (TSP) Transportation System Plan. It is anticipated in taking up to 24 months to complete. and will be used for the next 20 years plus.
- **Exits - 135 & 136** - Meeting with ODOT to determine future connectivity and improvements.
- **Valentine Avenue** - The plans are now 50% complete from the Engineers, they are currently under review. It's all going as scheduled with construction to begin this coming spring.
- **Waite St./Safe Routes to Schools** - Currently the grant application is in process and due in by October 15, 2018.
- **Wastewater Treatment Plant**- On target and moving forward. You can see the project by driving down Stearns Lane near Hwy 138W. Updates are posted to the City's website routinely.
- **SFD** - To date, for 2018, there have been 65 single family dwelling permits issued by our department.

# Fire Services



## A NEW BEGINNING

September 1st, 2018 marked a milestone for your Sutherlin Fire Department. After being a “Fire Only” department for the last 3 years, with the help and consent of a Citizens Committee and the City Council, the Fire Department returns to a “Full Service” fire department. What this means is the Fire Department will now be responding to all 911 calls in the City including fires, medical calls, motor vehicle accidents, public assists, etc.

Beginning in September, the fire station is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. We will accomplish this with one additional full time staff person and a minor re-organization of current staff. These personnel, along with the Volunteers, and with the assistance of scholarship Fire Science/Paramedic students enrolled at UCC, will be staffing the station.

We have a very dedicated group of Volunteers who give freely of their time to train and respond to calls. They are a great team that we rely heavily on. However, we are always looking for more volunteers. We also rely on our cross-trained city employees for help during the day when a lot of our volunteers are working and unable to respond.

These four inter-dependent groups, paid staff, volunteers, crossed trained employees, and CWE students working together will provide the highest possible level of service to the citizens and visitors in the City of Sutherlin .

## Wastewater Treatment Plant



The new Wastewater Treatment Plant is moving right along with General Contractor Tapani, Inc. at the helm. As you can see from some of the pictures the walls are starting to go up with reinforcing bar and wall forms; they've also installed new sewer lines and manholes. At Ford's pond they've installed a new force main, diffuser header and rip-rap apron. They installed and completed a shoring system for the excavation of the new influent pump station wet well which included laying base rock and a concrete base. They also installed a new 24-inch PVC wye onto existing 27-inch final effluent outfall line to Calapooia Creek. Lastly, they reconnected the 4-inch sewer lateral to the new site sewer at manhole #4.
